



# About KDVA



## What is KDVA?

The Kentucky Domestic Violence Association (KDVA) is a coalition of Kentucky's fifteen regional domestic violence programs (shelters) providing services to victims of domestic violence and their children. KDVA provides resources, training, and technical assistance to its fifteen member programs.

In FY 2010, Kentucky's domestic violence programs sheltered over 4,525 victims of domestic violence and their children for a total of 228,916 resident days; provided non-residential services to an additional 27,294 individuals; and responded to almost 32,000 domestic violence-related crisis calls. Unfortunately, Kentucky's programs were unable to shelter over 1,400 victims and children due to lack of space.

## KDVA's Mission

The mission of the Kentucky Domestic Violence Association is to end intimate partner violence, promote healthy relationships and engage communities through social change, economic empowerment, educational opportunities and other prevention strategies.

## What KDVA Does

The Kentucky Domestic Violence Association was founded in 1981 by the staff of the six existing domestic violence programs (shelters) as a statewide coalition whose membership was to include all domestic violence programs in Kentucky. KDVA's purpose was to provide programs with mutual support, information, resource sharing and technical assistance; to coordinate statewide services; and to advocate collectively on behalf of victims of domestic violence and their children.

An early goal of the coalition was to work with the Cabinet for Families and Children to ensure that domestic violence services were available across the state. Since Kentucky has such a large number of counties (120), the Commonwealth is divided into fifteen, multi-county Area Development Districts (ADDs) for planning and service provision purposes. In 1985, Kentucky reached its goal of having one domestic violence program in each ADD.

## KDVA Training Institute

The mission of the KDVA Training Institute is to provide diverse educational opportunities to individuals and organizations, with a focus on ending violence against women from a social justice perspective. Another goal of the Training Institute is to contribute to the economic self-sustainability of the Kentucky Domestic Violence Association. KDVA is a non-profit organization with a goal to create awareness and help combat domestic violence in the Commonwealth.

## KDVA's Training Center

The Kentucky Domestic Violence Association Training Center is available for rent to organizations, businesses and groups or individuals who are looking for a spacious and accommodating facility. KDVA staff will work with your group to ensure your training or meeting needs are met and that your group has a satisfying experience.

The Kentucky Domestic Violence Association offices are located in Frankfort, Kentucky with convenient access to interstate I-64. Our facility has a meeting space conducive to various types of meetings, trainings or other events.

## Amenities include:

- 1,750 square foot space able to accommodate up to 150 people reception style, 60 people classroom style or 40 people in a hollow square style setup.
- Separate outside entrance to the meeting space.
- Full-size kitchen with microwave, stove, dishwasher, refrigerator, commercial coffee maker.
- Dual entry into the kitchen area to make buffet-style service efficient.
- Meeting room is equipped at no extra cost with: overhead projector, LCD projector with standard VGA connection (bring your own laptop), wireless internet connection, 8" x 8" projection screen, TV/VCR, dry erase board and flipchart.

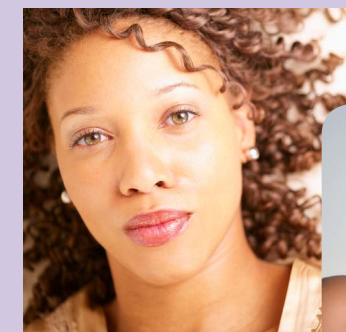

**Eddie Farrey** is a training instructor with the Department of Criminal Justice Training. He has twenty-three years of law enforcement experience. He earned a Masters of Arts of degree in Adult and Higher Education from Morehead State University.

**Lisa Gabbard** graduated from Georgetown College with a Master's degree in Education in 1993. Van served with the Maysville Kentucky Police Department for over 23 years the last six as Chief of Police.

**Tonya Jernigan** completed her undergraduate work at Transylvania University in Lexington, KY in 2005, obtaining a Bachelor's degree in psychology and a minor in women's studies. She completed her graduate work at the University of Kentucky receiving a Master's of Social Work in 2011. Ms. Jernigan has received her certified social work license from the Kentucky Board of Social Work. Ms. Jernigan currently serves as the domestic violence therapist at Chrysalis House, Inc., which provides long-term residential substance abuse treatment to women and children.

She pursued her graduate degree in Social work and received her Master of Social Work Degree from the University of Kentucky in 2004. **Andrea Miller** has over ten years of experience handling case management both in non-profit, rehabilitative, and medical settings. Populations served include adults and adolescents with physical and psychiatric disorders, and persons receiving public assistance benefits. **Kendell Nash** graduated from the University of Kentucky's Martin School with a Masters in Public Administration with a focus on Non-profit Management and Environmental Policy. **Beth Workman** has a bachelor's degree from the University of Kentucky in Communications. She is currently working on a Masters in Public Administration at Kentucky State University. Ms. Workman is the IDA Program Coordinator at the Kentucky Domestic Violence Association. She administers economic justice programs throughout the state of Kentucky and the AmeriCorps State and VISTA programs which connect volunteers to community agencies.

**Dr. Carmella Yates** is a graduate of the University of Kentucky's Department of Psychology in 1998. Dr. Carmella P. Yates is a clinical psychologist licensed by the Commonwealth of Kentucky. In addition to receiving her doctorate, Dr. Yates is also certified by the University of Kentucky, College of Medicine in the Medical Behavioral Sciences. Within the specialized field of substance use disorders, Dr. Yates has experience working with both males and females in residential treatment, outpatient treatment, and in the Federal Prison System. Currently serving as the Director of Clinical Services at Chrysalis House, Inc. in Lexington, Dr. Yates manages a staff of approximately 35 therapists, case managers, support staff and other personnel for the delivery of substance abuse treatment services to women and their children.
